Legislative Update:

Big win for BCSO, other -08 schools in 5-year review; ODE votes 18-0 in favor of status quo

Every five years, the Ohio Department of Education (DOE) is required by law to review and re-approve its administrative code (as are all State Departments in Ohio), and this year our "08" (non-chartered, non-tax supported schools) section was up for review. There were those in the department wanting to change it in a way that was not helpful, so we communicated that we were not in favor of these changes.

The DOE was coming on strong to change the Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) to align with (in their opinion) the Ohio Revised Code (ORC). Our argument has been that our schools are neither "public, private, or parochial," or homeschools, for that matter, but are a fifth category. We (Izaac and I) testified before the full Board each of the past three months, most recently this past Tuesday (7/14/20, below), following which they voted. We were a little surprised when the vote came out 18-0 in our favor. We praise the Lord for His working in such a way!

Public Testimony before Ohio State Board of Education July 13-14, 2020 Regarding Amending 3301-35-08 (Five-year Review)

"President Kohler and Ohio Board of Education, thank you for giving us another opportunity to speak again regarding the proposed amendments to the Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) 3301-35-08, the section pertaining to non-chartered, non-tax supported schools ("because of truly held religious beliefs").

The non-chartered part we love; it speaks of the fact that we don't ask the state's permission to teach our children, or look to the state for academic content or teacher qualifications. Non-chartered means non-licensed, and a license is a permission. Yet we are legally-operating, and we love that as well, because the state is an institution of God, and we as churches respect and work-together with the state and with families, the third great God-ordained institution. (I actually personally am interested and listen to what the state has to say regarding what it means to be educated, and I have great respect for the state-approved education community, and have things to learn from them, even though education is inherently religious, dealing with knowledge, values, attitudes, and vision.)

Our schools are non-tax supported, and don't even receive transportation or auxiliary service help, and we are not asking for it, which is shocking, even as we reach out to minister to broken and financially-impoverished situations. I often over the years have thought of the Bible story when Nathan the prophet told King David as he exposed his sin with Bathsheba, of the poor man who had a solitary, dearly-loved sheep, which was taken by the rich man who had many to fix for his guests—leave us alone! 08 is working, turning out educated, well-mannered citizens! Nothing needs changed! No stakeholders (the ones paying the bill) are asking for this to be changed.

To speak to another point raised earlier, I close with a second Bible story, this one featuring the children of Israel in Egypt, before the LORD delivered them through Joseph and Moses. It is written, "and there arose a pharaoh who knew not Joseph" (Exodus 1:8). Perhaps making these "non-substantive" changes to the 08, rewording it with the understanding among those assembled here today that we are not changing anything is not a problem here today, but what about the future, when you and I are not the ones working together?

We are asking you to leave the 08 wording as it is."
